Volunteers are also completing a large quota of navy kit bags which are presented to them as they leave for overseas. During October 100,000 of these were distributed.

Hospital planes, ships and trains are all stocked with knitted and sewed garments and at present the demand is greater than the supply. Mrs. O. W. Ray is chairman of production for the chapter.

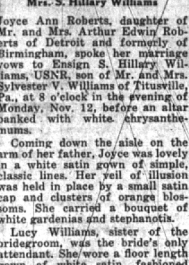
