ANN ARBOR—Nov. 23 and 24 will be Homecoming week at the University of Michigan. With the traditional Ohio State Michigan football game on Saturday afternoon as the highlight, several additional events have been arranged for the week end by a student committee headed by John Paul of Detroit. A Pep Rally will be held at Ferry Field on Friday night, with a torchlight parade led by the University of Michigan marching band. This will be followed by a Varsity Night program, the first since 1942, in Hill Auditorium. Special music by the band conducted by William D. Revelli, plus several sets of campus talent, will be featured. Joe Gentile and Ralph Binge, of radio fame, will be masters of ceremony and will interview Tom Harmon, Bob Westfall and Hal Newhouse. Dormitories, fraternities, and sororities will vie for honors as the best decorated house within the limitation of the ten dollars permitted for expenditure on decorations. An informal dance at the Intramural Building Saturday night will conclude the Homecoming festivities. Benny Carter and his orchestra will play for the dance.

U. of D. Basketball Team Now At Work For Nov. 30 Game

With the opening game little more than a fortnight distant, Coach Lloyd Brazil as yet has little idea how his University of Detroit basketball team will line up for the first tip-off Nov. 30. Only one letterman of the 1944-45 team is among candidates working at present. Al Vagnetta, a forward who scored 78 points in 21 games last season will be among the leaders when the season opens. Jack Richardson, a 1943-44 letterman who has returned to action after war service, and Chet McDonald, a squadman from last season, are the only other players who have seen action with the Tigers before. Two other 1944-45 lettermen, Center Gene Malinowski, and Forward Joe Pulte, will report at the end of football season, but may not be in shape for the opening game. A pair of transfers, Gino Sivan, of Assumption College, Windsor, Ont., and Don Hamilton of Detroit Tech., are showing to advantage in early drills, and may win starting berths. In three years at Assumption, Sivan scored more than 1,000 points, and Hamilton, 6-foot-3 rebound artist, is an able ball handler.
