We are not among those who believe that
the security of a nation, and the peace of
the world can be adequately safeguarded by
any international agreement not supported
by force of arms. At the same time, we do
not ignore the moral value of such a pact or
the possibility that if it is signed there may
be concerted action by nations to enforce it.
The atomic bomb, from all descriptions, is
a devastating agent of destruction. There is
some possibility that is thorrible potency will
persuade nations to outlaw its use. Something
of the sort has prevented the use of pioson gas
on civilians and the dropping of bacteria
upon enemy populations.
Effective retaliation has restrained belligcrents from the indiscriminate use of gas and
germs. The same consideration may tend to
prevent the deliberate use of the atomic
bomb, but we should understand that the
threat of retaliation must be positive to exet
pressure against those who might gamble on
a knockout.


