 Sibby Bothersox, by Mabel Leigh Hunt. Lively story of a little girl who imagines playmate, told with humor and understanding.

Choosing a good one out of the writer is enough to terrify Santa himself. Baldwin Public Library, therefore, with some trepidation, humbly offers a list suggesting books for the youngest of the reading public. These and similar books will be on display in the library for a few days.  
**Two New Ones**  
 What Mother's Little Cherub wouldn't love one of those engaging little books equipped with characters you can feel? (Remember the gorgeous "Fluffy Kitten" of last year?) There are two new ones—The Woolly Lamb, by Helen Hoke and The White Bunny and his Magic Nose, by Lily Duplake. Both are simple stories; the pictures are treated so that the reader may look and feel to his heart's content.

 Flicka, Ricka, Dicka and their New Friend. Three impressive little Swedish girls make friends with a crusty old gentleman.  
 Majas and the Kitten, by Helen Hoke. Amusing, tender story of a great St. Bernard's friendship with a kitten.  
 Burlap, by Morgan Dennis. Hilarious tale of a houn' dog that should have been a prime rabbit dog—only he loved rabbits and wouldn't chase them for the world.  
 Tony Sarg's Alphabet. Might as well learn that old alphabet a pleasant way.  
 Twinkle, the baby Colt, by Lawrence Barrett. Thriller for a five-year old about a new colt that ran away.
