"Ann Arbor—The lone figure watching Michigan's football practice this week is Ensign Harold Watts, until a couple of weeks ago regular center for the Wolverines. After the Navy game he was shifted from Ann Arbor to Glenview, Ill., to get his commission, sidetracking his football and college career for a while.

"Now he is on leave and each day watches the lads go through their paces. In the back of his head was the idea somehow he might get into Saturday's battle with Ohio State. He had no doubt he was needed, and pound for pound he is one of the best linemen in the East."

"Yesterday he discussed his problem with Coach Fritz Orliser. Orliser agreed it might be possible to enroll him for a week in school and he would immediately be eligible."
