Birmingham Rotarians Monday noon at the Community House were given a brief "behind the scenes" description of newspaper-making and those who write the news by Alfred H. McKeown, Sunday display advertising manager of the Detroit News. The speaker was introduced by Rotarian George R. Averill.

Mr. McKeown cited several instances to prove that advertisers do not control the publication of news concerning them, and stressed the fact that most newspapers make a sincere effort to obtain accurate facts in gathering all news.

He also related a few humorous incidents about the late C. C. Brainer, for years a News reporter and commentator over WWJ, as well as mentioning the work of H. C. L. Jackson and W. K. Kelley, News columnists.

Mr. McKeown is a past president of the Detroit Rotary Club and was a director of Rotary International in 1937-37.
