

David Bradt Home After 14 Months of Duty Through Europe

David A. Bradt, former Birmingham young man who resided in Washington, D. C. for about three years before going into the armed service, has just returned to Birmingham to make his home. He is a guest at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Mott, Pilgrim Street.

Of his war service Bradt said that the scream of a German SS and the crash of a bridge told him that he had escaped by a hair's breadth when he crossed a bridge at Saarbrücken. He had just made the other side when the enemy shell demolished the bridge behind him. This veteran declared that his toughest assignment was driving trucks on supply runs for 72 hours without sleep. The only rest he had was between runs while the trucks were being loaded and unloaded. Private Bradt served with the 603rd Engineers attached to the 12th Army group. When Private Bradt came home from overseas he was attached to the 103rd Engineers, 28th Division. He was in service three years, and overseas 14 months. He holds the Croix de Guerre (French medal) with two palms, awarded for the battles of Breach and St. Lo, the Luxembourg Medal of Honor and the ETO ribbon with five campaign stars.
