**Birmingham Women Have French "Feast" At State Meeting**

"We were so hungry after lunching on what would be a typical French big meal of the day that we came home and ate again at Mintz," said Mrs. F. W. Sevitt at the October meeting of the League of Women Voters, in describing the recent experience of board members who were fed thus after a lengthy and hunger-provoking meeting of the State Board at Lansing.

To bring home to local Leagues the contrast between "our land of plenty and the meager subsistence standards of European war-torn officers served those attending the meeting a wisp (1 and one-fourth ounces) of meat loaf, one small potato with no butter; some French bread; one teaspoon jam and a scant five and one-half ounces wine. This would represent the largest meal in a daily diet of a city soldier. He assumes for the other two meals: one tablespoon fat, one-sixth ounce cheese; scant one-third cup milk; and the remainder of a total 12 slices of bread. Absence of vegetables, concentration on cereals and scarcity of proteins will be noted.
