## Dearborn Upsets Birmingham 24-0 In Annual Game

Experiencing the first defeat of the season, Birmingham was beaten on by a heavy but fast Dearborn eleven 24-0 at Pierce Field Friday night. Two runs of 18 and 53 yards by Bill Geiger, Dearborn fullback and state class A, 440-dash champion, were the outstanding performances of the night.

Dearborn outplayed the Maples, 278 yards rushing to 107.

Birmingham threatened to score easy when Bud Gasser blocked a Dearborn kick on their 28. Erig Dearborn's defense tightened and Ted Le Claire intercepted a pass.

Mixing their plays beautifully, Dearborn marched right back to drive a drive. Dearborn's own 28. Erig and Le Claire gained consistently through the Maple line, but Dearborn failed to pass from Grigg to Le Claire. The point after the touchdown was missed and Dearborn led 6-0.

A few minutes later, Grigg dashed around right end from his own 20 containing several Birmingham defenders to score. Again Dearborn missed the point and led 12-0.

Unable to gain through the opponents' line, the Maples kicked out of bounds on the Dearborn 47. After one play Grigg galloped right tackle to score his second touchdown. The point was missed and Dearborn led 18-0 at halftime.

In the closing minutes of the half Thurston threw a long pass to Dan Grigg, Birmingham end, who made a beautiful one-handed catch on the Dearborn 10, but time ran out before Birmingham could score.

Dearborn's last marker came when Le Claire intercepted Thurston's pass on the locals' 33. From here the Dearborn backs drove to the three from where Grigg carried the ball over. This ended the scoring with Dearborn victory 24-0.

Birmingham will journey to Mt. Clemens Friday afternoon for its second league encounter of the season. This will be Birmingham's first afternoon game, the contest starting at 3:30.

Mt. Clemens' previous record indicates four losses, one of which was a league game to Port Huron, 20-13. Birmingham's record stands at one win, two ties, and one loss, their one league game being a 0-0 deadlock with Hazel Park.

Captain Quinn of Mt. Clemens is still dubious of his starting lineup, many of his players being injured in their recent game with Port Huron. The Bathers' line averages 160 pounds while their back field is led by Captain Clarence Shradar, a returning veteran.

Captain Quinn hopes to have his charges in top condition for this battle. Last Friday Watson was out for a routine game and several others were just not in good shape physically. The entire team seemed sluggish and slow.

With the resumption of play between these two schools fans will see the revival of an old high school rivalry. Birmingham's game with Mt. Clemens ranked second only to the turkey day rivalry in importance and spectators are promised some good football.
