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### League of Women Voters Celebrating Its 25th Birthday

Members of the Birmingham League of Women Voters who are reading their October "Spot News," the monthly news circular published by the Michigan League, find that there begins this month a history of the League, celebrating its twenty-fifth birthday this year, which may be interesting to persons outside the organization who have long wondered exactly what it is.

Mrs. Frank Haskins, state president, who will speak to the local League at its November meeting, has written this history.

She describes the bitter hundred year fight of women in this country to obtain the right to vote; anti-suffrage tomatoes at speakers' women went to jail; were feared at in the press; suffered all kinds of indignities. When, however, Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt, national president of the National Woman's Suffrage Association, foresaw victory a year before the 19th amendment was adopted, she called for "a living memorial" to the memory of our departed leaders. . . . and suggested a League of Women Voters "so that women may use their new freedom to make their nation safer for their children and their children's children." The new organization was launched the next year, 1920.

Twenty-five years old this year, the League, a non-partisan organization, still seeks to inform women on current issues and politics so they can vote more intelligently; still encourages citizen participation in government through voting; still welcomes any and all who are interested to join its ranks.
