New Ohio Senator

James W. Huffman, Democrat, is Ohio's new U. S. Senator, appointed by Governor Lausche to the unexpired term of Harold H. Burton, Republican, now a Justice of the U. S. Supreme Court.

Discharged under the point system, Corporal Roach had served 30 months overseas with the AAF Weather Service in the Southwest Pacific theater of operation. Most of his time in this area was spent at Malakal, Sidney, Brisbane, Cloncurry, Darwin, Port Moresby and New Guinea observing weather conditions for American and Allied combat and transport planes.

For his able and exemplary service as a weather observer Corporal James Roach was recently given a letter of commendation. In addition, he had previously been awarded the American Defense Medal, Distinguished Unit Citation with One Oak Leaf Cluster, Asiatic-Pacific Campaign Ribbon with Three Bronze Stars, and the Good Conduct Medal.

He entered service in December, 1943, received his weather observing training at Selfridge Field, and went overseas in January, 1944.

Overseas he served with the 49th Fighter Group, Royal Australian Air Force, 15th Weather Squadron, and participated in the East Indies, Papan and New Guinea campaigns.

At the time of his discharge Corporal James Roach was serving in the 24th Weather Region which includes Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Montana, and northern Utah.

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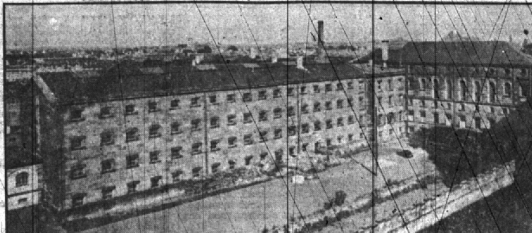
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Infamies of Belsen Described

Re-enlisted Men Are Wanted by the Army

Today's army offers many advantages and privileges practically unheard of by men who re-enlist in this army, who had to Birmingham this week.

A man with World War I service who enlists in the regular army is entitled to his mustering-out pay, the equipment allowance, choice of service and the theater in which he wants to serve, the Captain pointed out.

The regular army offers an education, the opportunity to travel, and a career with lifetime security, the recruiting officer declared.

All men discharged from the army between May 12 and Nov. 1 of this year are urged by investigators to re-enlist in the regular army.

Enlistments are being taken now at the U. S. Recruiting office, 53 1/2 West Huron street, Pontiac, Cantain Trumpf said.
