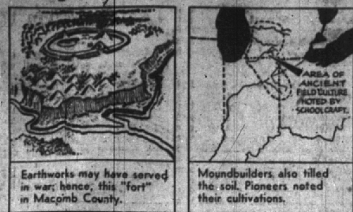


## Michigan History in Pictures

## Piety Hill Chapter, D.A.R., Gets Report On Chapter Activities For Past Year

At a recent meeting of Piety Hill chapter, D.A.R. Mrs. H. P. Halliday, corresponding secretary, made her annual report.

She reported on many of the chapter's leading activities and said in part:

The first objective of our organization is "to perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American independence." One of the most significant means of accomplishing this aim is to renew interest and knowledge of American history. There is nothing comparable to music as a harmonizing agent and to induce better acquaintance with our country's music means the strengthening of a background that is important for American citizens both old and new. Piety Hill chapter enjoyed an all music program at Christmas time and generously contributed records for the men at Percy Jones Hospital.

Also under this objective we find the work of the Filing and Lending Bureau and the department of Genealogical records.

During the year four Michigan trails were marked and the graves of two Revolutionary soldiers located.

In the last few weeks the Governor Winter home in Pontiac has been acquired by the Oakland County Pioneer Association. The D.A.R. is interested in making this a Michigan historical shrine. Also recently announced is the inauguration of a Michigan historical collection in Ann Arbor.

The second objective of our organization is "to promote institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge." First under this aim comes the work with the American Indians and last year a scholarship was given to a Michigan Indian high school girl.

Under the American program the D.A.R. sponsor club work with young people at teen-age gatherings, organize children's clubs, helps with citizenship preparation and naturalization classes. One of our members has been very active in organizing our Birmingham Teen-Canteen. Two members assisted in the preparation of a class for citizenship and another helped in a course of naturalization during the past year.
