charge from the Navy. He is in Japan at present and has been in the Navy for four years.

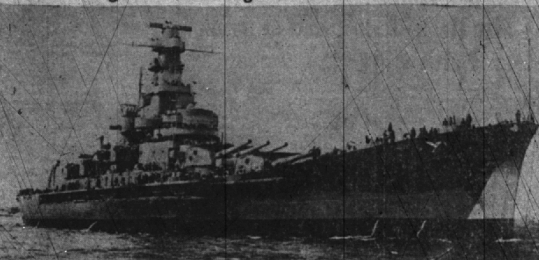
AIRPLANE MECHANIC
