Funds Secured Will Be Used to Further Aid For Veterans

Mrs. Ralph M. Hoofnagle, president of the Birmingham S Club, has proclaimed Saturday, Sept. 25, as the 3rd Annual Tag Day, sponsored by the MOMS to raise funds for the organization's work.

The money donated on Saturday will be used for interesting needs in the hospitals, administered through the Camp and Hospital Council of the Red Cross. The club also maintains a discretionary fund for the aid of local veterans when the need arises.

There are still many boys who need MOMS in a recent survey of needs at Perry Jones hospital. It was reported that canes, curtains for the mess hall, flower vases, trays, rubber soles, uniforms and record albums were in urgent demand. Through the Camp and Hospital Council the MOMS will be able to buy wheel chairs for veterans who will be in them for the rest of their lives, at a saving of \$42.22 per chair.

Group of Women In Study of Europe's Winter Food Needs

"Would you be willing to continue rationing of foods and keep the high point values of meats in order to send food to the starving people of Europe?" That was the question which Mrs. John K. Ormond, state chairman of the Women's Action Committee, for Victory and Lasting Peace, asked each of the women who met at her home on Monday, Sept. 10, to consider this question of food for the liberated people. Some of the women were vehement in their approval.

Mrs. R. S. Plexico gave figures showing the average daily caloric consumption in some of the liberated countries.

Mrs. Charles Shain gave the additional information that even if UNRRA received all the meat it asked for it would only amount to one pound for every 64 pounds consumed by each United States civilian.

Mrs. Wilbur Johnston asked a rather pointed question: "If the end of rationing of food in the United States may mean that people of Europe will starve this winter if the termination worth while?"

Each of the women present agreed to write to Secretary of Agriculture Clinton Anderson asking him to see that the government make sufficient supplies of food and other needed items available at once to the liberated people.
