

School Cafeterias Are Popular

Non-day meals were served in both of Birmingham's school cafeterias beginning on Monday this week, according to a statement made by Dr. Dwight B. Ireland, superintendent of schools. The Baldwin High School cafeteria and Barnum Junior High School was returned three years ago, when Dr. Ireland first came to Birmingham. Starting a project of this sort when he first arrived here was a difficult job, however, but the results have paid for the labor many times, he says. The cafeterias were inadequate at that time and materials, such as metal trays, were not easily obtainable. Although the local ration board was more than cooperative, rationing furnished its pitfalls too.

Bargain has a 20¢ plate luncheon with the dessert and milk and coffee extra. A luncheon served three times consisted of potato salad, pork and bean, deviled egg and roll. The dessert was fresh fruit and cookie. A whole week's menu is posted in the cafeteria each Monday.

School officials feel that parents who send their children to the school cafeteria may rest assured that they are well provided for.

Pick Harold Watts As Starting Center

When Birmingham's contingent of football fans get consistently seated in the stadium at Ann Arbor Saturday, they anticipate seeing Harold Watts, the Baldwin High School football prospect, doing the job at center for Michigan. Coach Fritz Crisler has named Watts as his starting center.

Although not a 200 pounder, Watts is considered fairly heavy, being listed at about 180 or 185 pounds. His work as a regular last year and his showing in summer training has pleased Crisler greatly. Watts, who weighs 180 and has saved Michigan some real embarrassment last season. He recovered many enemy fumbles and also did some fine tackling and some great ball passing.

Watts went to Michigan in 1943 from Baldwin High School. He later entered the naval training unit there. But for football he was considered a bit light for the center position but got his chance at Ann Arbor.

The Birmingham kid will finish his college career at the University of Michigan. He did so well at Crisler's camp that he was especially on offense.
