Among the classes offered are china painting, jewelry making, oil painting, typing, photography at Roosevelt building, the various crafts such as electricity, radio, sign painting and others; home nursing, crafts, and a host of other topics.

The business courses are receiving heavy early attention with bookkeeping and shorthand leading.

An announcement from the school states:

"The Board of Education Parula Adult Evening School announces a program of courses starting each week of Sept. 17 and running for thirteen weeks, which should prove attractive to the public. It has been our aim and desire to offer courses which will provide helpful and educational.
