**Kresge Additions To Open Saturday**

The S. S. Kresge store is to open its recently added store buildings just to the south of its present store on Saturday. The additional store space increases the store's Woodward avenue frontage by 24 feet. It was occupied by Tuggey's Real Estate office at 167 North Woodward, and the R. H. Shop, at 163 North Woodward. The property has a total of 79,000 sq. ft., giving Kresge an additional area of approximately 2708 square feet. Woodward avenue entrances to the annexed stores are being retained and new interior entrances give access from the original Kresge store to the annex. New signs have been provided for the added store front. The interior has been redecorated to harmonize with Kresge's existing color scheme.
