"Know Your Home County" will be the keynote next Monday, April 15, when the League of Women Voters will meet at 10:30 a. m. in the Community House.

Beginning at one o'clock, League members and visitors, who are cordially invited, will strive to become familiar with Oakland County governmental operation; what it provides for its citizens, and its strengths and weaknesses in a lively afternoon's discussion to be directed by the county government committee, according to program chairman, Mrs. F. G. Garrison.

For the purpose of instructing the vote of its delegates to the coming national convention, April 19 to May 2 in Kansas City, Mo., the League will consider, in the morning, proposed important changes in the by-laws of the national organization. Related to crystallizing local League opinion on the economic policy to be set up at the national convention, will be the exposition by Mrs. Peter Loomis and Mrs. James Dunne of federal deficit financing versus balanced budgets, respectively. Plans for a League informational service in connection with June's primary national, state and county elections will be proposed.

After "bring-your-own" sandwiches and Community House coffee served by the social committee, the League will discuss the recess, the county government committee will present a synthesis of its year's concentrated study.

From the characteristics of county government," as explained by Mrs. Robert Silbar, chairman, committee experts will proceed to a report on county social welfare by Mrs. Edward Proctor, to be presented by Mrs. J. F. Gordon, on the county health work by Mrs. W. W. Williams, on "Justice in Oakland County" by Mrs. A. S. McCall, on finances by Mrs. E. W. Clarke, on the Board of Supervisors by Mrs. Wilbur Johnstone, and on roads and highways by Mrs. Lee A. White. Others on the committee include Mrs. W. B. Mainland.
