Betty Mae Nicholas, Drayton Plains was chosen Dress Review delegate to represent this county at 4-H Club Week to be held in June at Michigan State College.

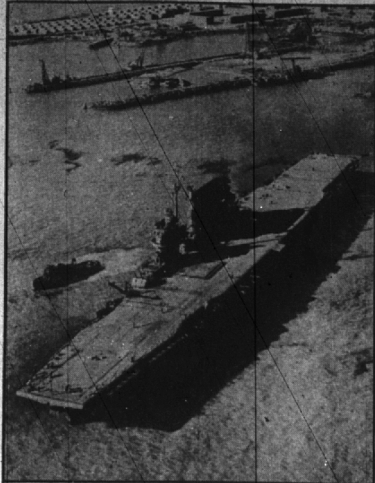

Ready for Bikini—Come What May



Carrier Saratoga leaves San Francisco Navy Yard, prepared to be a guinea pig in the atom bomb tests at Bikini Atoll. The Saratoga was a 46,000-tonner when geared for battle. More than a thousand men manned her. Question: What can man's newest and most destructive force, which blew the insides out of Hiroshima, a city of 318,000, do to such floating forts as this? Opinion of Navy men in general—those hearing one—is that the bomb will damage most ships and sink some. But one scientist says the bomb will finish off everything afloat within a 10-mile radius. About 100 naval ships of all types will be submitted to the test: atom bombs exploded in the air, on the surface, and deep under the surface.

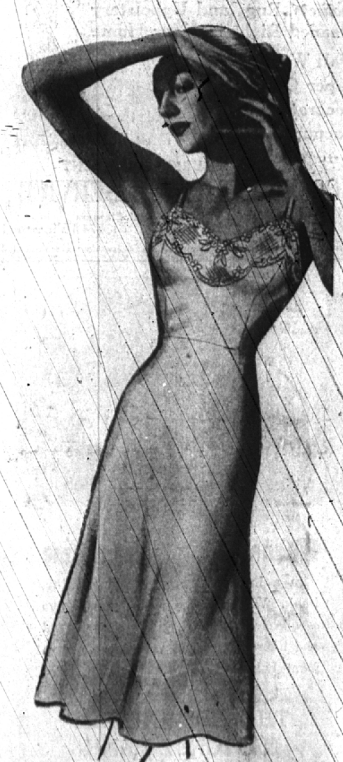
