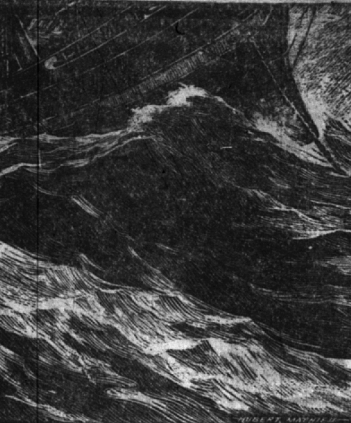
The favorites are the cheeseburgers and hamburgers Mrs. Ransier tells, and they go out with everything on them, thus she thinks it is time the hamburger had a name.

Registration For School Election Is Urged By League

The League of Women Voters education committee, headed by Mrs. B. K. Swartz, will send P. T. A. meetings and will distribute 5,000 informational "fliers" to urge registration from May 10 to June 1 for the Birmingham school election to be held June 10.

Mrs. William M. Milligan will emphasize the League's plan of 12 members of the League office in the Municipal Building for this purpose.

The League will publish the names of the clubs, and their presidents, which have 1946 registration, according to Mrs. A. Swartz.

Already Under Way
The Soroptomist Club, the Catholic Study Group of Holy Name Church, and the Present Day Club have already been addressed by League members, Mrs. R. E. Eche and Mrs. Victor Oeden.

It is more important to remember that registration for school elections is separate from that of general elections, and is held at the Board of Education offices at Hill School," stated Mrs. Swartz. "Qualifications for registration for this election on general school issues are different than before. To vote you must be a U. S. citizen, 21 years old, and must be a resident of the State of Michigan for six months and of the school district for 30 days prior to the date of election. It is also important not to confuse the school elections June 10 with the national, state and county primaries, June 18," she added.

Housewives Told How To Aid Food Drive For Europe

Birmingham has been asked to assist in the save food for Europe campaign and are given nine ways in which they can help. The suggestions come from Mary Woodward, county home demonstration agent. She points out that the overall needs of the war-torn world are so great there is no limit to the American food that can be used to save human life.

Following are the recommendations:
Cut down on wastage of bread in every way possible. It is estimated that one slice of each loaf goes into the garbage.

Reduce the amount of bread through substitutes such as potatoes and oat cereals. Fruits may be used instead of cakes and pastries.

By use of alternate foods, use less wheat cereals for breakfast. Save cooking oils by making more use of meat drippings for cooking and seasoning foods. Hold down the number of fried foods that are served.

Save and re-use fats and oils for all cooking purposes. Hold on to bacon grease for cooking and render excess fats or meats.

All fats that cannot be re-used should be salvaged and turned in to the butcher or grocer. Take it easy on oils and salad dressings.

Albert de Salle Of J. L. Hudson Speaks To Decorating Class

Albert de Salle, assistant manager of J. L. Hudson Co. fine arts department, spoke on the "Use of Pictures in Contemporary Rooms" before the A.A.U.W. interior decorating class Wednesday morning, April 10.

He urged that homemakers permit new ideas to enter into their decorating schemes and suggested that pictures be selected which suited the personality of the home and the surroundings where they are to be used. Mr. de Salle said, "Pictures should not dominate their surroundings, but assist in bringing out the idea of the rooms where they are hung by the balance, proportions, and intensities of their areas."

He urged that "we learn to look at pictures and permit ourselves to enjoy the color, forms and proportions that seek to translate on mood into another mood. The present trend of decoration depicts that walls be the visual interest; correctly hung and carefully chosen pictures are the best means of exciting this effect."
