**Baldwin To Stage Model Meeting Of Security Council**

The Security Council will come to Birmingham next month in model form, to be presented by Baldwin High School students for the benefit of fellow students and for the general public.

On May 15, in Baldwin High School auditorium, there will be two presentations of a model meeting of the eleven-man Security Council; the first, in the afternoon, for students, and the second, in the evening, to the community.

Suggestion for such a model Council meeting came from the Birmingham League of Women Voters, one of whose projects has been to stimulate public interest in UN.

**Two Art Exhibits Are Being Arranged For Museum of Cranbrook Art Academy**

The Museum of the Cranbrook Academy of Art is announcing two current exhibitions, "Variety in Abstraction," and "Paintings from Latin America," circulated by the Museum of Art, New York City.

Variety in Abstraction features the work of fifteen paintings by leading abstract artists of this century, such as Braque, Picasso, LeGrip, Malevich, Mondrian, Kadiinsky, Klee, Arp, Mirro, Masson, Duchamp and Matisse.

There are two main currents in the abstract painting of the 20th century: one characterized by an intellectual, structural, classical approach; the other more emotional in spirit, fluid and organic in design and romantic in its approach. Visitors to this exhibition will see how Klee and Arp took up the abstract as a base for their personal fantasies, to be translated further by younger abstract painters such as Masson and Mirro. These paintings, with descriptive labels, will give the visitor a glimpse of the rich variety to be found in the work of the abstractionist.

The republics of Argentina, Brazil, Chile, Colombia, Cuba, Mexico, and Uruguay are represented in the collection of Paintings from Latin America, and the works of Rivera, Orozco, Siqueiros and Portinari are included.

Although the paintings in the exhibition show the variety and quality of Latin American painting, ranging from realistic portraits to abstract surrealism, the compositions and many of the pictures have a special interest because they are concerned with the people and background of the country which produced them. A Cuban tornado with chairs and horses hurtling through the air, the magnificent mountains of Colombia, a Brazilian holiday, are some of the themes interpreted in these paintings.

These exhibitions will be on view at the Museum of the Cranbrook Academy of Art through May 2, after which they will continue on a tour of other museums and galleries throughout the country.
