Mrs. Donald S. Bell and Mrs. Percy Storor are assisting Miss Thompson as divisional co-chairmen for this area. The meetings were held to acquaint workers with procedure to be followed during the enrollment of new members for the Morristown, New Jersey, school that educates dogs as guides for the blind.

Morris S. Frank, vice-president of The Seeing Eye, Inc., attended the meetings with his guide dog, "Buddy" and talked of the work and accomplishments the school has achieved in its aim to provide a means of independent travel for men and women who have lost their sight. According to Mr. Frank, Puerto Rico and Hawaii have recently been added to the expanding list of localities where blind people are using Seeing Eye dogs. Seeing Eye graduates also may be found in every state in the Union, the District of Columbia and Canada.

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U. OF M. EXTENSION SERVICE
