**Virginia Adelaide Matthews Speaks Her Marriage Vows**

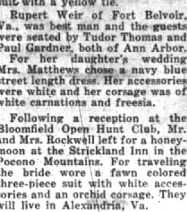

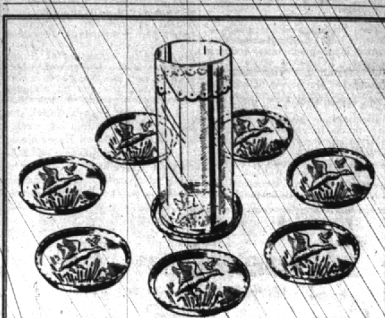
