

Plum Hollow Gets Qualifying Round Of U.S. Open June 3

Sectional Qualifying Rounds for the 1946 United States Golf Association open championship tournament will be held at Plum Hollow Golf Club on Monday, June 3rd, 1946. The play will be 36 holes stroke play.

The National Open was last held on June 3-7, 1941, at the Colonial Club, Fort Worth, Texas, and was won by Craig Wood, then of Wingfoot Golf Club, New York, with scores of 73-71-70 and 70, for a total of 284. There were 1,048 entries, 172 qualifiers, and 163 starters.

The practice dates at Plum Hollow Golf Club will be on May 29th and May 31st. It is said that further details concerning this tournament will be available in the very near future.

Hal A. White, secretary of the Detroit District Golf Association will be in charge of these qualifying rounds and supervise play.
