Proclamation

WHEREAS the President of the United States, as Commander-in-Chief of the Armed Forces has designated April 6, 1946, as Army Day throughout the United States and in our overseas installations and

WHEREAS the purpose of Army Day is to pay tribute to those soldiers who made the supreme sacrifice and also to those who by their heroism, sacrifice and devotion to duty made possible the defeat of our enemies on the field of battle so that this nation might survive and again live in peace and

WHEREAS the soldiers who have had long and arduous war service can return to civilian life only when replaced by the Regular Army which is now being organized and recruited for that specific purpose.

Therefore, as Mayor of the City of Birmingham, I do proclaim April 6 as "Army Day" and the week April 6-12 as "Army Recruiting Week" for the City of Birmingham.

I hereby call upon the citizens of the city to appropriately celebrate Army Day by the display of national colors, parades and by meetings and any other way that we can demonstrate our appreciation for the services of the men of our Army.

I further call upon the local citizens of Birmingham to give all possible assistance to the Army Recruiting Service during "Army Recruiting Week" so that the thousands of our soldiers now overseas may be brought back to Michigan and to their homes.
