The Eastern Michigan League champs will open their season at the River Rouge Invitational, April 12. Coach Lloyd Cooper will field a big squad with only six returning letter-men. By means of the intra-squad meet and weeks of practice, the large squad is rounding into the shape.

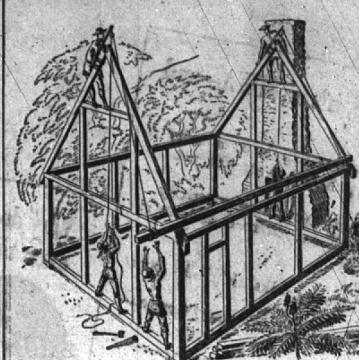
