

Soon There'll Be No Let-Up From Maple Onto Pierce and THA

By C. R. A. "No Let-Up" signs which will prohibit west-bound Maple from turning south onto Pierce should make their appearance at the strategic points within a short time.

This action was authorized by the City Commission Monday night in a resolution to follow the recommendations of a recent survey by the Traffic Research Staff of the Automobile Club of Michigan.

The survey suggested that the utility of the west-bound lanes on Maple would be increased by the erection of these "No-Turn" signs.

Traffic proceeding north on Pierce, however, will still have the privilege of a left-hand turn onto Maple.

The Commission okayed this move with an additional provision that the signs "put some point on the pavement."
