U of M Concert Series Program Is Announced

Charles A. Sink, president of the University Musical Society, University of Michigan, has announced a comprehensive schedule of concert attractions for the University of Michigan for the coming season. In the Choral Union Series ten concerts will be provided.

James Melton will inaugurate the sixty-eighth annual series October 16. He will be followed on October 30 by Soren Petri. On November 10 the Cleveland Orchestra, under its new permanent conductor, George Szell, will make its seventh annual visit; and on November 19 Yehudi Menuhin will return to the scene of many former triumphs.

Recital by Lotte Lehmann The Icelandic Singers under Sigurdur Thordarson will be heard November 25; and Serge Koussevitzky will bring the Boston Symphony orchestra for the fifteenth consecutive session on Monday, December 3.

After the Christmas vacation, Vladimir Horowitz will be heard January 17, followed by the Detroit Symphony Orchestra under Karl Krueger on February 17. Lotte Lehmann will give a recital on February 26; and the Choral Union Series will be brought to a close on March 16 by the Chicago Symphony Orchestra under De-sire Defauw.

In between, the annual "Messiah" performance will take place Sunday afternoon, December 15, with the following performers: Lura Stover, soprano; Ellen Repp, contralto; Ralph Lear, tenor; Aiden Edkins, bass; University Choral Union, Special "Messiah" Orchestra; Frieda Ott, Helt Vagan, organist; and Hardin Van Deusen, conductor.

May Festival Dates Told The Seventh Annual Chamber Music Festival of three concerts will take place January 24 and 25, when the Budapest String Quartet will participate for the third consecutive season in three concerts—Josef Roisman and Edgar Or-

tenberg, violins; Boris Krutz, viola, and Mischa Schneider, violoncellist.

Dr. Sink also announced that the fifty-fourth annual May Festival of six concerts will take place Thursday, Friday, Saturday and Sunday, May 8, 9, 10 and 11—four evening performances and matinees on Saturday and Sunday.

The Philadelphia Orchestra, Eugene Ormandy, conductor, and Alexander Hilberg, associate conductor; University Choral Union, Hardin Van Deusen, conductor; the Youth Chorus, Marguerite Hodt, conductor; and distinguished soloists, both vocal and instrumental, will participate.

Original Cherry City, Traverse City Is Being Challenged by Erie, Penna.

The original cherry city, Traverse City, has been challenged by Erie, Pennsylvania.

The Pennsylvania cherry growers are indeed copy cats. They sent "the biggest pie ever" to the President of the United States. They, too, had the pie presented by a beautiful cherry queen . . . although not as pretty, according to this correspondent.

About that pie. It may be true that it weighed sixty pounds, and it may be true that the crust was three inches thick, but that's no virtue in a pie, as any housewife knows. The best pie crusts are not thick, but thin and flake. Adding to the weight was the 70-lb. pie tin especially constructed by a Pennsylvania blacksmith. Many a Michigan pie has been two feet in di-

ameter, but Michigan pies are never heavy.

The fact is that Michigan cherries are more famed, and plentiful. Erie county in Pennsylvania doesn't begin to produce cherries in quantity. Grand Traverse county produces almost five times as many.

A comparison of the cherry history of the two counties gives all the honors to the Grand Traverse county.

The last report shows that the 571,732 Michigan cherry trees produced 23,423,479 pounds, as compared to the 179,347 trees in Pennsylvania producing 5,356,732 pounds.

But even if there are not more cherries in Erie County . . . there may be more Democrats and so Senator Joseph Guffey, of Penn-

sylvania, had little difficulty getting his big cherry pie presented over at the White House.
