Plans for the coming Labor Day weekend have been formulated by the Birmingham Country Club, which will sponsor a championship of all-ages tournament, beginning Friday and continuing through until Monday. Group A golfers are those whose ages are 23 and under; group B, those whose ages range from 24 to 29; group C, 30 to 39; group D, 40 to 49; group E, 50 to 59; and group F, 60 and over. This will be an 18-hole contest. Grand prizes will be awarded winners in each age group.

On Labor Day itself, there will be a two-half mixed foursome in the afternoon, and the morning will feature special events.

Saturday night there will be a dinner dance for which Del Delbrink and his orchestra will play, while Sunday there will be pool events for beginners, juvenile and advanced swimmers. Prizes will be awarded these winners, also. A buffet supper will be served that night, and a similar supper is listed for Labor Day.

Staging of five specialty club shows as a part of the Oakland County dog show and the ladies' bred event in Royal Oak on Sunday, Sept. 1, is definitely attracting some of the nation's best dogs, early registrations indicate.

MEAT CUT Quiz

Q. What is the name of this cut of meat? A. This is Canadian style bacon, shown in the roll. It is an entirely different cut from ordinary bacon.

Q. What is Canadian style bacon, and how is it identified? A. Canadian style bacon is the portion of the pork loin which has had the bones and tenderloin muscle removed and which has been cured and smoked. It has the appearance of a roll and is often enclosed in a stockinet or cellophane covering. The meat is very lean and is the same color as smoked ham.

Q. How is this cut prepared? A. When cooked whole, Canadian style bacon may be roasted in an open shallow pan in a slow oven (300° F.) or it may be simmered in water. When cooked and properly stored it will keep a long time. Sliced Canadian style bacon may be broiled, pan-broiled or fried. When cooking by each of these meat cookery methods care should be taken to cook the meat slowly.
