**Southfield Township News**  
At the regular Southfield Township Board meeting held Aug. 20 in the Berg road township hall, several issues were settled, among which was the decision to buy fire fighting equipment for the new 8-ton fire truck recently purchased. Representatives from several companies brought information concerning a bronze pump to be mounted directly behind the driver's seat. The pump can be used for small fire inside walks, attics, and roof fires, using a low pressure line, as well as big fires which will require high pressure. After due discussion the board decided to give the contract to American Lube, a franchise company of Columbus, Ohio, at a cost of \$1,750.05. Bids on fire hose, sirens and other equipment are being considered.

Another application for a cab stand was temporarily denied a non-resident of the Township, due to the fact that only two weeks ago an ex-serviceman resident was granted permission to operate a cab stand at Telegraph and 12 Mile road. C. E. Stevens, supervisor, said that he believed that one cab stand would be adequate at this time. Three men were appointed as Examining Board for licensing electrical contractors and journeymen. They include: C. E. Cook of Detroit Edison Co., Earle Bulle of Berkley, and Ben Clark of the Townsite Board.

## Smaller Airlines May Use Local Airport, Berg Says

Two new storage hangars to house five planes each, will be seen at the Berg airport soon, according to Milton Berg, owner of the field. Excavation has already been completed and the hangars, which will be 160 x 24 and constructed of concrete blocks, should be up in the next few weeks.

Other plans for airport expansion include the purchase in the next few months of a Coast passenger plane which will carry five people. The field will operate an air taxi service to Willow Run airport, a distance of about 40 miles from Birmingham, Berg indicated. "There is little chance that air-

lines will ever use our field as a stop because there is no reason for them to," Berg said. "The smaller air lines, however—such as the Michigan Central Airline which uses five-passenger planes—may include Birmingham as a regular stop. They have already stopped at the field several times. In the future one of their route stops may be our airport."

Runways at the airport are getting another coat of gravel to make them more serviceable. "Our runways are laid out like those of any other large airport," Berg said. "They are just about the same size as the runways at the Detroit City airport; only they are not concrete. It will probably be several years before any extensive paving will be warranted out here."

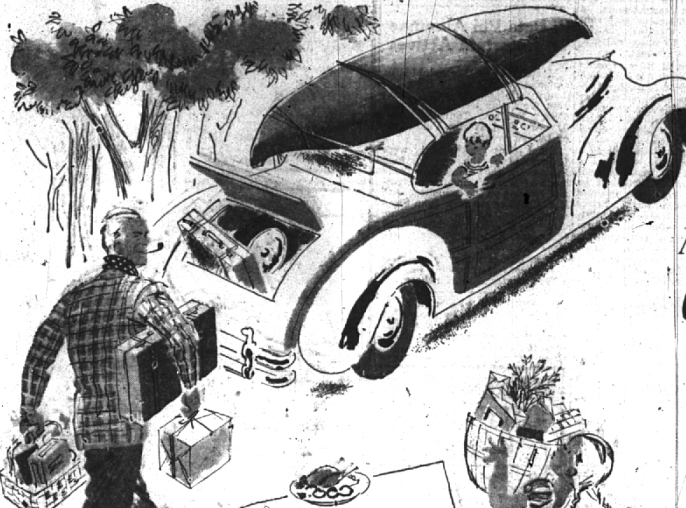
