### Beautiful Christmas-Inspired Entries Take High Honors and Prize Ribbons

Enthusiasm ran high at the tenth annual Christmas Flower Show, staged in the Community House Monday afternoon and evening by the Birmingham branch of the Woman's National Farm and Garden Association.  
 During the tea hour about 750 were served in the Rath Shain room while numberless guests continued to come and go until the doors closed in the evening.  
 The long, narrow tea table, arranged by Mrs. A. E. Ulrich, reflected the spirit of Christmas with its covering of scarlet cloth edged with silver, and centered with green poinsettias and various greens in a long, low pottery bowl. Tall, white candles burned on the table side in silver candelabra, and the mirror caught and reflected the burning candles and settings on the tea table.  
**Miniature Natural Forest**  
 Adding much to the charm of the entire setting was the music of the pipe organ, which was donated for the occasion by Mrs. Henry Ford.  
 The stage was a miniature natural forest, lighted in the center by an old-fashioned Christmas tree which reflected its bright color into the distant background through clever lighting effects. Mrs. Carl Biege was responsible for the stage setting, receiving a blue ribbon from the judges for it.

It was an antique pewter "Goddess of the Garden with Angels" bearing aloft an arrangement of silver juniper, Scotch pine and holly berries. Another outstanding exhibit of Mrs. Dibble's was a hand-carved "Madonna and Child" of the 17th century, complemented by an arrangement of euonymus, dried hydrangeas and magnolia leaves, flanked by a tall amber candle.
