**Local Man Named Vice-President Of Tractor Firm**

Thomas A. Farrell of Birmingham, former assistant general manager for the Kelvinton Division of Nash-Kelvinator Corporation, has been named vice-president of the newly formed Dearborn Motors Corporation, Frank R. Pierce, president, has announced.  
Appointment of Farrell was the first made by Pierce since he became head of the company which, in June 30, 1947, will succeed Harry Ferguson, Inc., as distributor of Ford tractors and a new line of farm implements.  
Farrell, who has lived in Birmingham since 1939, was with General Motors for 21 years, resigning in September, 1939, to become eastern sales manager for the Kelvinton Division of Nash-Kelvinator.

A native of Newark, N. J., he attended public schools in that city and was graduated from Lafayette College in Easton, Pa. Joining the Ford Bearings Division of General Motors in June, 1918, as a rate setter, he rose to the position of sales manager of the transmission division by June, 1928, when he was transferred to the Frigidair Division of General Motors as assistant sales manager.  
He lives at 325 Wellesley drive with his wife and a daughter, Janet.

**City, Businessmen Agree On Alley Right-of-Way**

Agreement was reached Monday night by Commissioners and owners of property along the proposed Maple-Willets alley, to allow the City to acquire the land right-of-way for the alley, with the exception of one small parcel of land in the rear of the Quarton building on W. Maple.  
David Levinson, owner of the building and property, appeared at the meeting and the Commission members that the 13 1/2-foot by 35-foot parcel in the rear of the building was of more potential value to the property than it could be for the alleyway. "If the building was expanded in the future, that northeast corner would be needed, and it is really not essential that it be included in the alley area," he stated.  
He agreed to allow the City its use for alley purposes on a day-to-day basis, until such time as it might be needed.

**Ben J. Anibal Named To New Job At Pontiac**

Harry J. Klingler, general manager of Pontiac Motor Division, has named Ben J. Anibal to a position in the Division's top managerial group.  
Ben J. Anibal, of Lone Pine Road, Bloomfield Hills, one of the industry's famed engineering pioneers and in charge of Pontiac engineering since 1925, moves to the newly created position of assistant general manager. As such he will work directly with General Manager Klingler with particular attention to future engineering trends and planning.  
George A. Delaney, long ranked as a top automotive engineer particularly in the experimental field, becomes chief engineer, succeeding Anibal.  
"I feel that the Division is particularly fortunate in having the proven talents of such men as Anibal and Delaney at its disposal. The fact that their abilities will be given wider scope in their new positions as the dominating factor in their choice."  
Anibal, known as the "father" of the Pontiac car, has been directly responsible, as engineering manager, for more than 200 advances in automotive engineering. Anibal joined the Olds Motor Works in 1909 following graduation from the Michigan State College.

League's belief in a strong tax policy now while national incomes are at the present high level. The organization bases its stand on the opinion that debt reduction is advisable to minimize the carrying charges and help modify inflation.  
League activity in the housing and foreign policy fields were also discussed with Dondero.  
**Child Worker Bill**  
The child worker bill expected to be presented to the 1947 session of the State Legislature was the main topic of the meeting with Estes and Down. The League is supporting the bill now being drafted by the Michigan Legislative Council of which it is a member.  
Both men agreed that revisions in the present child work law are advisable.  
Remainder of the meeting with Down, senator from the 12th district, and Estes, representative of the 3rd district, was devoted to discussion of the League program supporting further consolidation of schools and establishment of minimum standards as a requisite for receiving state aid, a more practical limitation of bonded indebtedness for construction of school buildings, and fair employment opportunities by legislation.

**Set Tomorrow For Hearing Of Local Man On Rape Charge**

Charles W. Marshall, 45, of 908 Humphrey, will face examination tomorrow morning before Birmingham Justice John J. Gallin on charges of attempted assault and rape and taking indecent and improper liberties with his two step-daughters, one aged 10, the other aged 7.  
Marshall has entered a plea of innocent on both charges.  
According to the complaint filed by Marshall's wife, Lillian, on last Friday, the alleged assault and liberties took place on Sunday, Dec. 8.  
Marshall, arrested by Birmingham police Friday, is being held in the Oakland County Jail in Pontiac, having failed to post a \$1,500 bond.  
Gallin's examination tomorrow will determine whether evidence against Marshall is sufficient to have him bound over to Circuit Court on one or both charges, or whether the case will be dismissed for lack of evidence.

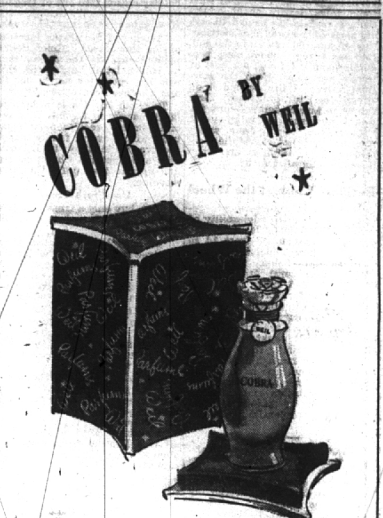
