The ages for the young artists are between 20 and 30, independent musicians, 16 to 20 years.

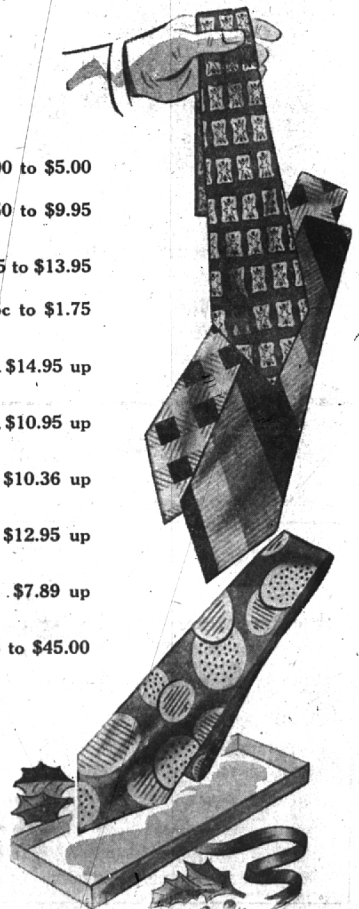
