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Two B'ham Boys Advance Football Careers At MSC

Two of the best athletes Baldwin High School has produced in recent years were members of the Michigan State varsity football team this fall and both were given awards.

Bill Spiegel won his letter after playing in every game at right half and Bud Gasser won a minor award after his promotion to the varsity squad midway in the season.

Spiegel was one of the fastest backs on the Spartan team. Besides being an accomplished ball carrier he showed much ability at passing and kicking, both of which he does from the left side.

Among his season's accomplishments were two long touchdown runs.

Spiegel won three letters each in football and baseball during his high school career here and during the year he played football and baseball on the service teams at Gulfport, Miss., and Avon Park, Fla. He weighs 175 pounds and is 5 feet 10 inches tall.

Gasser, who graduated from Baldwin High last June, first matriculated here at Baldwin University where he was still on the varsity squad when he decided to transfer to State.

He was elevated to the MSC varsity squad just prior to the Kentucky game. He played in several other games, but it was in the Kentucky game that he turned in his best play.

It was also in this game that he sustained a painful jaw injury that handicapped him in some of the future games.

Bud won letters in every major sport at Baldwin. He is one of the few athletes to accomplish this feat in the local high school. He is a six-footer and weighs exactly 200 pounds.

Bud is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Harold H. Gasser of 768 Sufferd and Bill is the son of Mr. and Mrs. William S. Spiegel of 455 Chestnut field. Both boys are freshmen and will have three more years of competition.

Community House to Convert Storage Room into Modern, Fully-Equipped Workshop

In response to many requests from organizations and individuals, the Community House Board at its last meeting approved the expenditure of \$800 to install a new craft shop in the House.

The large storage room next to the lunch room will be converted into a modern, fully equipped shop. Equipment to include benches, fluorescent lights, a power-driven buffer, a potter's wheel, storage cabinets, and complete sets of tools for silver, ceramics and leather working in the House.

Construction work on the new room is scheduled to begin at once.

Will Hire Instructors

The program built up around the crafts shop will begin with three crafts—silver working, leather working and ceramics. The Board will engage competent teachers for new crafts to be introduced.

It is planned to offer classes for junior high and high school students and adults with a registration fee of \$1 and \$2, respectively. The fee is to help cover the cost of the equipment. Classes will be limited to approximately 15 students in any one period so that each student may receive a good attention.

According to Frank J. McGinnis, board member, class periods will be offered in mornings, afternoons and evenings.

In making the appropriation for the new equipment and construction, McGinnis stated that the Board hoped many organizations and individuals in Birmingham would demonstrate their interest in this work by helping to defray some of the initial cost. All contributions to the House funds will be gratefully received.

Those who will be in charge of the new program are Mrs. Hogg McLeslie, Mrs. A. J. Toomer, Mrs. Hans Scholten, Mrs. Karl Lutz, Mrs. Wilbur Johnston, Miss Mary Wild, recreational director of the House, and T. Hollister Mabley.

Further activities to be carried on under the program will be announced later by the committee.
