Issue of October 31 With Jac Pfister running third, the Birmingham cross country team placed second in the State meet at Yosilani last Saturday morning by taking 68 points.

Issue of November 7 In the State elections held Nov. 5, Birmingham residents went to the polls and cast 4,047 votes for Kim Sigler, the election of the off-year record for the city as 4,890 out of 7,783 registered electors appeared in the city's voting precincts.

The Rotary club of Birmingham voted Monday at a special meeting to give a \$3,000 fund toward the Cummings Street Park. The city government will keep its earth brown patent. City Commissioners agreed Monday night in backing City Manager Donald C. Egbert's proposal that Birmingham's guest huts should be painted white with a green trim.

In a mock election held election day, even the students at Baldwin High School voted a landslide for Kim Sigler. He drew 234 votes against Van Wagoner's 14.

Issue of November 28 Quentin Braford, Birmingham boy and former Baldwin High School track star, climaxed a spectacular career on the cinder paths Monday afternoon when he finished first in a field of 147 cross-country runners in the annual National Collegiate Athletic Association run held at the East Lansing, Mich., track.
