### New Plan May Solve Oak St. Situation

This present attitude of John L. Lewis in leading 400,000 coal miners to leave their jobs, thus curtailing the American economy, is but the revelation of a tyrant, inner, tyrannical nature.

Opening of a new street midway between Raynale and Oak and extending from Leikens east to Woodward and Hunter avenues was offered by the City Manager Monday as the most logical solution to establishing an access street to property owners in the northwest sector of the city.

Manager Donald C. Egbert has suggested that Oak street traffic from the northwest section should be diverted to the new street by cutting across the northwest corner of Lake Park and Oak to connect with Midland, hence east to Woodward and Hunter.

Raynale street, he said, could be swung back to join with the Oak street cut-off at a point near the northwest corner of Greenwood Ave.

Could Develop Property  
"This proposal, I believe, would drain the traffic from the northwest section of the city into Woodward and Hunter over a street which would be especially designed for that purpose," Egbert said.
