Paced by Janky Dick Blauman and Bob Daeschner, the Maples rolled to a 17 point scoring spree that was aided by superior height and ballhandling to take a 28 to 11 advantage at the third quarter horn.

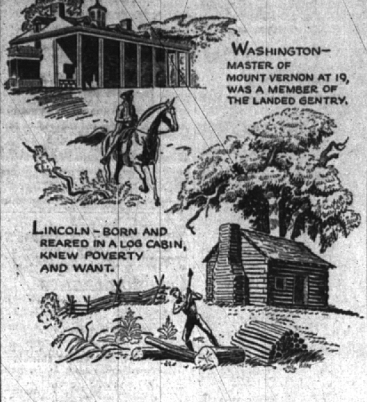
