During intermission, W. Brooke Stabler, Headmaster of Cranbrook School, welcomed the members of the Detroit Symphony orchestra and guests and introduced Director Karl Kruger. 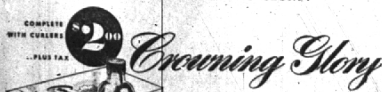
