

# H. Dale Rue Tells of Trip to Holy Land

(Editor's Note—Following is the second installment of H. Dale Rue's personal story of his recent trip into the Holy Land. The former Birmingham young man is now in Africa with the Army. Mrs. Rue plans to leave soon to join her husband in the Dark Continent. Still another section of his story will appear next week.)

"Darkness comes suddenly in the desert and we drive for hours on end without passing a car or sign of life except these lonely-looking shepherds.

"About 8:30 we encountered a barrier across the road and discovered that we were stopped at the border between Sinai and Palestine. An Arab officer in gaudy uniform took our passports and after about a 15-minute delay we were permitted to go on.

"We were stopped again at about 9:30 by the Palestine police at another district border and encountered considerable trouble due to the fact that our visas did not suit the officer in charge. His English was so limited that we had great difficulty making him understand and it looked for a while as if we might be refused entry way out there in the middle of the desert and practically in the middle of the night. Every time he would try to study our passports the crude electric light in his little station would go out. We used up all our matches and lighter fluid trying to provide light for him. Finally he started to get his supervisor on a funny French telephone. He would crank the phone endlessly and then cry some name into it, then after jabbering for a few minutes he would hang up the receiver and start the cranking all over again. That went on for at least a half hour with no result. Finally Mr. Ramsey asked if any of us had cigarettes, so I unpacked my bag from the trunk of the car and we gave him and his assistant each a pack of Old Golds. Miraculously the officer succeeded in making his point and after an unending amount in jabbering we were permitted to pass and continue on our way.

"Shortly we began to see signs of mountain-like hills on both sides in the beautiful starlight and bright moonlight. After driving alongside the hills for a couple of hours, the highway finally turned up through the cliffs. The road was terribly crooked and we soon encountered a dense fog. The balance

of our drive into Jerusalem was handicapped by the fog.

"At last, after nearly nine hours of desert driving, we began to see some lights, indicating that we were approaching civilization again. We passed through a considerable city which we thought was Bethlehem, but later determined was Hebron. We arrived in Jerusalem about 11:30, and Mr. Ramsey took us to the Y.M.C.A., where rooms had been reserved for Dawley and me. (Mr. Ramsey had reservations at the American Colony.) To our amazement the "Y" was magnificent.

"It is a gorgeous structure, built about ten years ago at the expense of one million two hundred thousand dollars as a result of a contribution made by the late James N. Jarvis of New York. Mr. Ramsey was largely instrumental in promoting the project and obtaining the contributions. He made four trips to Jerusalem in connection with the completion of the building, which is daily justified in the great pride he has in its conception and in the really great work that it is doing for the deprived young men in the Holy City. Our rooms and in fact all the accommodations were on a par with our best hotels in the States.

"The building is composed of three sections, typifying the Holy Trinity and also the threefold function of the Y.M.C.A. The central section is the dormitories, offices, dining rooms, etc., with a beautiful tower extending into the sky that can be seen from miles around. In the belfry are some of the finest carillon chimera in the world, equal to the one at Silver Springs, Florida. The music from the chimera was glorious during the entire holiday season. The domed sections on each side of the main building are composed of a beautiful auditorium on one side, in which is a marvelous pipe organ. On the other side the section contains an excellent gymnasium, a beautiful large swimming pool, and a marvelous reading room adjoining the finest library in the entire country. The architecture of the structure symbolizes the Christian objective of the institution and spirit of the Holy Land. It includes priceless features taken from old ruins with rugs, tapestries and paintings to complete its impressiveness.

"After we had breakfast at the

The Kladder brothers volunteered to get their father to guide us to the Holy spots—he has worked for years with the O.K. Tours organization, and knows every spot and all the history of the Holy Land. So, with Mr. Kladder, we left in our staff car for Bethlehem.

"We stopped on the road at the Star of Bethlehem and the Wall of the Magi where the Wise Men are said to have seen the reflection of the star of Bethlehem."
