NAVY SEEKS MEN

Fleming, officer in charge of Navy recruiting in lower Michigan. "Ex-Navy men, particularly, will find it profitable to investigate the advantages of re-enlistment in the Navy," Comdr. Fleming says. "Former members of the Regular Navy or Naval Reserve who re-enlist in the Regular Navy within 30 days after discharge are enlisted with the rating they held when released. In addition, they are entitled to 30 days' re-enlistment leave with pay."
