The League had been requested to send members to address the Institute, a six-community educational program sponsored by Dearborn and joined in by Ecorse, Garden City, Lincoln Park, Melvindale and River Rouge school teachers, during the course of the morning's program, devoted to the UNO, on the subject "What Should We Teach about UNO?"

Following a general address on the international organization by Earl S. Johnson of the University of Chicago, the League visitors led an discussion group. These were Mrs. Blair Swartz, chairman, and Mrs. O. R. Snelman, of the education committee, who described and explained UNESCO (the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization). Mrs. Pretz took with her a display of periodicals, pamphlets and books related to the day's topic.
