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### Founder's Week to Be Observed Feb. 10-16 By Local A & P Store

Rust, in securing the health situation in Oakland county, as one typical example of the work being done for which the League needs money.

Mrs. Rust stated, "Mrs. Williams, in a recent preliminary report to the League's committee on local county and municipal government indicated certain needs for which the League needs money."

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### Local Women Enjoy Ann Arbor Session

A large group of Birmingham women were in Ann Arbor last week for the mid-winter conference of the Michigan League of Women Voters. Great interest was shown in the address by Dr. George Ford, of the University of Michigan faculty, on "Local and County Government Organization."

Mrs. Robert Silbar, chairman of the Birmingham League committee on municipal and county government which is planning to distribute layman's reports of local government when its research is complete, reported that Dr. Ford's summation of the need for Michigan county reorganization coincided closely with the findings of her own committee to date, as did the fact that work towards this end has been going on for 20 years, futilely, against well organized resistance.

**Study Virginia Plan**

The Virginia plan was also outlined for Dr. Ford's talk. "This plan is relevant to Michigan's problem because Virginia had about the same setup and type of restrictive constitution," he said. "But Virginia adopted, by constitutional amendment, an optional statute plan which did not provide Home rule, but gave each county three forms of government: (1) to continue the same; (2) to have a county manager who appoints department heads; (3) to have a committee plan, the executive having only the power of recommendation of appointments to the department heads."

Mrs. Maurice Pollak, Highland Park, Ill., member on the National Board, led the second day's session with a report on the "League of Women Voters." At this informal give-and-take over representatives of leagues all over the state, the feeling was repeatedly emphasized that the League women and seek members from every age, racial, religious and economic group, whether housewife, factory business or other employe, farmer, teacher or student.

The League has received a "call for action" from the British League before Congress last session, according to Mrs. R. S. Flexico, chairman of the local committee, international relations working out this program.

"This 'call for action' means that the League, as a national organization, favors the loan," said Mrs. Flexico, "and is asking each of its members to write her congressman to vote favorably. In the Birmingham area, we are writing to Rep. George A. Dondero, House Office Building, Washington, D. C."

### U. of M. Scholarships Available For Every High School In State

ANN ARBOR—One or more graduates from every accredited high school in Michigan may have a chance to be awarded a Regents-Alumni Scholarship at the University of Michigan.

The scholarships provide a sum equivalent to semester fees for the freshman year, with provisions for retaining their high school principal. Applicants must be in the hands of the University of Michigan by Feb. 21, 1946.

One of the scholarships is available for a graduate of each accredited high school in Michigan provided there is a qualified candidate. Additional scholarships are available for students in communities where more than one qualified graduate is available. Selection of the successful candidates will be made by the Scholarship Committee of the University of Michigan.

Applicants for the scholarships should come from the upper third of their graduating class. Interested students may obtain full information as to the requirements for the scholarships and the method of making application by writing their high school principal. Applications must be in the hands of the University of Michigan by Feb. 21, 1946.
