

Judge Holland Will Head Annual Drive Of Red Cross Fund

Judge H. Russell Holland will be chairman of the 1946 Red Cross Fund campaign according to C. G. Rudderham, chairman of the Oakland County Chapter, American Red Cross. The dates for the campaign have been set as March 1 through 31.

All funds received by each chapter during the campaign will be divided between the national organization and the chapter. Judge Holland will be assisted by an advisory committee headed by campaign chairman representing each township of the county.

Butter Supply Will Continue Scarce For The Next Few Months

The butter supply will continue to be scarce for at least the next two months, according to Howard P. Simmons, secretary-manager of the Michigan Milk Producers' Association. Despite the all-time high production of milk during the past year, the supply has been inadequate to meet the needs for bottled milk and cream and leave enough to satisfy the markets for ice cream, condensed, evaporated and powdered milk, cheese and butter.

During the war the government purposely set the price on dairy products to encourage the use for human food of the greatest possible amount of milk solids other than fats. To do this the price of butter was sufficiently low that butter was the least remunerative; therefore, the great bulk of milk was made into evaporated milk,

powdered milk and cheese, rather than butter.

With the season of increased milk production now approaching, Simmons states that more butter will undoubtedly be manufactured, provided the price on butter is increased to keep it in line with other dairy products. During the war years a part of the income from milk has been in the form of a government subsidy which probably will be discontinued by early summer. Just how dairymen, in the face of present high costs of feed and labor, will be able to produce profitably without price adjustments is the great problem in the dairy industry today.

Dr. George Marin Emphasises Need In Clothing Drive

"It is one of the worst things I see under Mr. Marin," to see children and adults in such dire need for all kinds of clothing, said Dr. Marin. "Cold. All clothing articles are extremely scarce all over Europe, especially in countries where the Germans carried off everything of this kind, leaving the people destitute, even to the extent that our own G.I.'s often gave their own jackets and shirts and shoes."

After that Dr. Marin, has been during his service with the 3rd Army, especially in Europe, he feels that the Victory Clothing Drive is a "most worthy cause," and he urges that every citizen who has the various charities of Birmingham have volunteered to serve in the clothing drive.

"Fuel in Europe and the Far East continues scarce and delivery to this country is being hampered by transportation systems. Therefore the need of clothing is more acute than ever."
