First Answers For Veterans' Question & Answer Bureau

Following is the first of the answers and questions in the Veterans' Question and Answer Bureau, conducted by Jack Thomas, the Birmingham veterans' counselor.

Mrs. J.W.B.—as yet the Army is not discharging officers on length of service unless they have sufficient number of points. It is quite possible that he will be discharged this year. His R.T.C. time before July 29, 1942, does not count. At the present, officers are discharged at 75, but due to the number of officers who are elected to remain in the service the Army may soon release officers on length of service.
