Two Series of Free Art Lectures Will Be Given in Detroit

Two series of free afternoon lectures will begin at the Detroit Institute of Arts this month.

"How the Artist Works" is the title of the series to be presented Thursdays at 2 p. m. beginning Jan. 17 for six weeks.

Subjects to be covered by Elizabeth H. Payne of the Institute of Arts staff include beauty of line, drawing, living form in sculpture, ways of working in oil and painting with water color. One of the lectures will be on the making and enjoyment of prints by Isabel Woodcock, curator of prints and another on the art of the loom by Adolf Conlin Weibel, curator of textiles.

The other series is entitled "Famous Interiors of the Eighteenth Century" and will be given Tuesdays at 2 p. m. starting Jan. 15 for four weeks by Joyce Gnas of the Institute of Arts staff. This series will be based on the recently restored and enlarged French Room gallery. Subjects to be covered include the historical background of Rococo style, the artistic heritage of Rococo France and the patronage of Louis XV.
