

Musical Benefit Concert Received With Enthusiasm

A large and responsive audience filled the Community House Tuesday evening for the benefit concert, sponsored by the Birmingham Musicians, the proceeds of which have been given for the work in musical therapy in Michigan veterans' hospitals.

The Musicians' duo-pianists, Alta Lynn Major and Maude Skinner, shared the program with Miss Faye Elizabeth Smith, one of Birmingham's own girls, who has reached the rank of a vocal artist and who came from New York for the event.

Miss Smith's three groups of songs, the first sung in Italian, the second in French and the last in German, were enthusiastically received by her friends. A warm and intimate relationship was established at once, her ardent handling of the traditional lullaby and the art songs of the French school showed a fine understanding of style, and she has the vocal equipment to do it full justice.

The two pianos opened with Bach's "Sicilienne" and the Andante and Variations from Opus 46 of Schumann. It was in their second set of numbers that the audience began to feel the exhilarating spirit which only artists can bring to a listener. The "Scenes from the Forest of Arden" by Debussy, the modern vein, by Octavio Pinto, was magnificently done.
