One of the most delightful phonograph recordings we've heard in a long, long time is George Kleinsinger's beguiling "Tubby the Tuba" recently acquired by Baldwin Public Library. Poor Tubby was mighty tired of his continual oompah, oompah all the time—other instruments—but when he tried, the whole orchestra laughed so hard that he slunk away in disgrace.
