### Exhibition of Textiles and Ceramics To Open At Cranbrook, Sunday, Feb. 3

The first biennial exhibition of contemporary textiles and ceramics has been announced by the Museum of Arts, starting Sunday, Feb. 3.

Exhibiting ceramists include Bernard Frazier, Marion L. Fosdick, Henry Varium Poor, Gertrud and Otto Natter, Arthur Baggs, Victor Schreckengost, Marguerite Wildgen, Leon Volkman, John W. Davis, Wajid Grotell, Nancy Lett, Lydia Winston and Lily Saarinen. Among the textile artists are Lillian Garrett, Angelo Testa, Marj Ehrman, Mrs. Anton Raymond, Mrs. Ann Albers, Marianne Strengell, Dusenbury and Robert Sailors.

Send Big Display

At the same time, by arrangement with the Pan American Union, the Textile Museum of Harvard University, aided in the selection of the textiles and edited the catalogue, for which M. D. C. Crawford, authority on textiles, contributed an introduction and technical descriptions.

The fifty textiles in the exhibition represent but a small part of the famous collection assembled by George Hewitt Myers in the course of almost twenty years. They are said to be among the finest in the world as far as technical virtuosity, perfection of design and color preservations are concerned.

The fineness of cotton and wool threads, the variety of dyes and the sophistication of patterns reflect the long period of development of the Andean civilization. Among the fabrics included in "Ancient Peruvian Textiles" range from 300 to 400 A. D. to the early 18th century. The latter exhibition will be augmented by the Cranbrook Museum's selection of Peruvian textiles covering the same period. Persian and Indian, Haitian, Spanish and French as well as Gothic textiles from the Museum's collection will also be represented.

Expert to Speak

Mrs. Adele Conlin Weibel of the Detroit Institute of Art will give a gallery talk on "Peruvian Textiles" Sunday, Feb. 3, at 4 p. m.

The three exhibits will continue through Feb. 25 and Museum hours are from 2 to 5 daily, except Monday.
