**Religious Themes Dominate Exhibition**

An exhibition of African Negro Sculpture is on display at the museum of the Cranbrook Academy of Art and will be shown until July 24. The exhibition is being circulated nationally, arranged and lent by the museum of the University of Pennsylvania. It is sponsored locally by the Birmingham Branch of the Association of University Women.

Objects shown are from the Central Belt of Africa and it is this form of art that influences such 20th century sculptors and painters as Picasso and Matisse. Wood and brass are the materials utilized and masks from Sierra Leone, the Ivory Coast and Nigeria are on display. From the Gold Coast, small cast figures, used in weighing gold dust, are shown. Primitive and traditional work is the keynote of the exhibition, with religious themes dominating. The art of ritual is also an influential factor.
