Oakland County RED CROSS NEWS

Mrs. L. L. Northrup, 1040 Gordon Court, chairman of nutrition for the Oakland County Chapter, American Red Cross, has invited residents of Oakland County who wish to assist with the famine relief program which has been instituted in this country in order that food promised by the United States may be shipped to hungry Europe.

"Serve potatoes instead of bread. The only place that potatoes do not make a good substitute for bread is in a sandwich. Watch bread waste. If every family in the United States would save only one-half slice of bread a day, the total saved would be one-half million loaves a day." "Save fats by using the frying pan less and the mixer, broiler and stew pan more. Use fat drippings for baking and seasoning." "Some preservation of goods is a release for the countries which are in dire distress. The Michigan State College extension division publishes a bulletin, "Wartime Canning." This bulletin with complete directions may be secured from the college. Many other bulletins can be secured from the U. S. Department of Agriculture at Washington, D. C.

The home service department of the Oakland County Chapter, American Red Cross, continues to serve Veterans and their dependents and active servicemen and their families. During the past month a total of 355 requests were acted upon which came from active servicemen while a total of 257 requests from veterans received action. The home service office at 410 Pontiac State Bank Bldg., Pontiac, has recently received many questions regarding emergency maternity and infant care as administered by the Michigan Department of Health. Veterans' wives are eligible for this care if the expected birth occurs within 230 days after the discharge of the veteran and if at any time during the pregnancy the veteran was in one of the four lowest pay grades of the Army, Navy or Marine Corps.

As there may frequently be questions about the time limit of 280 days, the Red Cross home service department suggests that an application should be filed so that the Department of Health may make a decision. Maternity care under this program pays full hospital bill and Physicians' charges and also allows for prenatal and postnatal care as well as at the time of delivery. Applications may be secured at the home service office in Pontiac.
